Course description

The purpose of this study is to do a close reading of Seneca and to understand his place in Stoic philosophy and Roman culture. We will focus especially on Seneca's letters on ethics.

Assessment

50% weekly writing assignments 50% final paper (5000–8000 words)

For the weekly writing assignments, one of you will do a summary of either (a) the assigned text in outline, or (b) a close analysis of a particular stretch of argument; the other will write up a discussion of interesting/puzzling/surprising/cool issues raised in the text. Aim for one to two pages; be concise.

Texts

We will be working from the following texts: <u>Sherman, Stoic Wisdom</u> <u>Seneca, On Benefits, trans. Griffin & Inwood</u> <u>Seneca, Anger, Mercy, Revenge, trans. Kaster & Nussbaum</u> <u>Seneca, Letters on Ethics: to Lucilius, trans. Graver</u>

Ideally, you would also work your way through: Inwood, *Reading Seneca: Stoic Philosophy at Rome*
